President Biden outlines National COVID-19 Strategy

Recently, President Joe Biden outlined his administration's national [strategy](#) to combat the COVID-19 pandemic. At this time, the strategy primarily focuses on the first 100 days of his presidency.

The major focuses of Biden's strategy include:

- Providing federal aid with a \$1.9 trillion stimulus package to combat the COVID-19 pandemic and provide economic relief
- Expanding vaccinations, with a goal of administering 100 million vaccine doses in 100 days
- Mitigating the spread of COVID-19 by expanding testing, mask mandates and public health measures
- Reopening the majority of K-8 schools within 100 days

Executive Actions

In the first days of his presidency, Biden has signed multiple executive actions intended to combat COVID-19, including executive orders aimed to:

- Expedite the production of vaccines and personal protective equipment by using the Defense Production Act (DPA)
- Protect the federal workforce, and require mask-wearing
- Establish the COVID-19 Testing Board and a health equity taskforce
- Improve and expand access to care and treatments for COVID-19
- Ensure a data-driven response to COVID-19 and future public health threats
- Require the Department of Health and Human Services and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to promulgate clear guidance on the reopening of schools
- Promote COVID-19 safety in domestic and international travel

What This Means

While the Biden administration's strategy begins to outline more details on COVID-19 vaccine distribution, White House officials have not yet clarified the timeline for when the vaccine will be available to the general public. As employers create return-to-work plans, they should continue to monitor developments for how these measures will impact their workplaces.
